COURSE OVERVIEW

SPLH 565 is a lab for hands-on learning to elicit a language sample and analyze it for different domains of language to ascertain a language profile of a person and infer the typicality of language development. Simply, you will understand the ways of collecting language samples, carefully reading through them, analyzing them using SALT software to determine a language profile and check for deviancies from typical language development.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of the course, you should be able to:

- Describe the principles associated with language sample collection.
- Transcribe orthographic language samples with SALT codes.
- Analyze language samples with respect to phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics and pragmatics.

COURSE POLICIES

Course Meetings

Weekly Readings

The readings will prepare you for assignments and will not be explicitly summarized during class time. Therefore, you must complete the reading prior to beginning the weekly quiz and arriving at class each week.

Weekly Lectures

Brief lectures (20 minutes) will begin each class period. These will build on topics discussed in the readings and further prepare students to complete the work for their weekly assignments.

Online Quizzes

Quizzes include multiple choice and short answer questions. These quizzes help students identify key concepts covered in the readings and lectures. Quizzes are worth 10 points and must be completed on Canvas by 11:59pm on Tuesdays. Quizzes are timed and students will have 30 minutes to complete each quiz. Students are required to complete all quizzes. *Assisting others with the quiz or receiving assistance is considered plagiarism and an honor code violation*.

<u>Assignments</u>

Assignments for each module are worth 15 points and are due by 11:59pm on Wednesdays. These are designed to be completed and reviewed in class for participation credit. Limited makeup assignments will be permitted on a case-by-case basis. Assignment documents will be available on Canvas by the beginning of each class period.

Projects

There will be 4 projects in this course. Each project is worth 30 points. Students are expected to complete them independently.

Deadlines
